SUBJECT: The wheels on the bus go round & round

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Bus crash driver was reading at the wheel

A bus driver has been sentenced after he lost control of the bus he was driving, injuring five of his passengers.

On 22 February 2016, the driver lost control of the bus he was driving as he negotiated a gap in the guided section of the track. The bus jumped over the track, travelled across an adjacent path and came to rest up the side of a grassy embankment. As a result, five of his passengers suffered injuries including a fractured spine, pelvis, ribs and whiplash.



The <u>HSE</u> found the driver was reading a time duty card whilst driving and therefore had no vision of the busway ahead, nor did he have a grip of the steering wheel. The investigation also found the driver was driving at speeds of 52mph, exceeding the maximum recommended speed in that area of 30mph.

The Driver, pleaded guilty to breaching Section 7(1) of the <u>Health & Safety etc Act 1974</u> and was sentenced to 12 weeks imprisonment, suspended for 12 months, and ordered to pay costs of £2,000.

Speaking after the case, HSE Inspector said: "Drivers of guided buses must remain vigilant at all times. It is especially important to do so when driving on guided sections as the absence of steering control may create a sense that full control of the bus is being maintained.

"Members of the public should be assured that HSE seriously considers the risks to their health and safety and takes appropriate enforcement action where necessary.
