SUBJECT: Driving Safety Forward

RECIPIENTS: All Council Services (including schools)

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Driving for Better Business (Highways England) have recently completed a survey of 1006 employees who drive for work and 255 directors who employ staff who drive. The survey sought to explore where employers' or employees' actions – or inaction – could contribute to an increase in occupational road risk through driver distraction; stress; poor maintenance practices; and lack of awareness or non-compliance with legal requirements. (*Occupational road risk* is the collective term to

describe all the hazards associated with driving for work)

The report found that:-

- 33% of employees who use their personal car for work said they do not have vehicle insurance that covers business use and only just over a third said their employer has checked their driving licence!
- 60% of employers stated they were unsure if any or how many employees use their own car to drive for work purposes
- 53% of employers believed employees that use their own personal car to drive for work purposes were not the company's responsibility
- 74% of employees who drive for work said when they do check their tyres, they just take a quick glance to see that tyres look 'OK'
- 66% of employees who drive for work said they get stressed trying to keep up with a busy schedule

Lincolnshire County Council take the safety of its employees very seriously, and in supporting those staff that drive for work, have recently introduced a new occupational driver policy called:- <u>G31 Driver</u> <u>Assessment Toolkit (DAT).</u>

This 3 stage process includes:-

- Driver Documentation Self-Certification
- Driver Training (e-learning) on the Lincs2Learn platform
- Driver Assessment+ (Praxis 42)

This 3 stage process is **mandatory** for any employee that meets the criteria of an "Occupational Driver" (for full definition of Occupational driver, see the G31 Driver Assessment Toolkit (link above)
